Law Enforcement: Trump Opioid Plan Misguided

Extreme Enforcement Measures Would Shift Policy in a Dangerous Direction

Washington, D.C. – Following the release of the Trump administration's <u>plan</u> to combat the opioid crisis today, <u>Law Enforcement Leaders</u> issued to the following statements:

"President Trump's plan recognizes the severity of the opioid crisis plaguing our communities. However, law enforcement officials who lived through our country's War On Drugs know that mass incarceration and the death penalty will not solve our country's opioid crisis," said **Ronal Serpas, Chairman of Law Enforcement Leaders and former Superintendent of the New Orleans Police Department**. "We are concerned that the extreme enforcement and penalty measures in the plan would shift policy in a dangerous direction."

"Decades of experience and data prove that America's drug problem is a public health crisis," said **Lucas County, OH Sheriff** and Law Enforcement Leaders member **John Tharp**. "The proposals in this plan must be revisited. Federal resources are limited, but should be focused on providing treatment to people facing addiction – and letting law enforcement spend their limited time elsewhere, fighting violent crimes."

"We know from experience and research that we cannot arrest and incarcerate our way out of addiction," said **Middlesex**, **MA Sheriff** and Law Enforcement Leaders member **Peter J. Koutoujian**. "This is a public health crisis. That's why I encourage the Administration to work with Congress and Executive agencies to focus on funding more community-based treatment and providing greater continuity of care for those leaving our jails, prisons, and houses of correction."
